


Overview

  - These figures do not include passive park users and special events



# 2016 Program Statistics Analysis

- Aquatics, Classes, and Sports are comfortably meeting community demand
- Senior/Adult Programming is losing participants due to overcrowding; 14 programming needs are being denied




# 2016 Facility Statistics Overview

- 158 Reservable Facilities and Parks
- 18,538 Reservations Made
- Sports Fields and Courts reserved 34.91% of the time
- Pavilions and Picnic Areas reserved 11.24% of the time
- Class and Meeting Rooms reserved 67% of the time
- Auditorium/Gyms reserved 94% of the time

### 2016 Facility Statistics

- Due to high class/meeting room reservation rates at Freedom Center and the Community Center, it is impractical to expand programming within current facilities to meet the needs of our Senior Community
- Due to 94% reservation rates at the Auditorium and Gym, expanding programming to meet the needs of active adults is not feasible with current facility constraints



### Current Issues

- Use of Freedom Gym is short term solution
  - School District could limit access at anytime
- Existing Senior Community Center is maxed out
  - It is no longer capable of meeting expanding community need
- No Senior Center gap analysis has been done



### Current Issues

- Neither City of Camarillo or PVRPD are exclusively responsible for Senior Programming
- Neither City of Camarillo or PVRPD receive funding specifically for Senior Center
- In 2016, PVRPD spent approximately \$300,000 on Senior Center Programming
  - Any expansion would increase programming cost
  - PVRPD does not have funding to both expand and staff Senior Center



### Current Issues

- PVRPD is the only Recreation and Park District in Ventura County that does not have an ongoing partnership with its local city to provide support for Community Senior Center
  - Camarillo Senior Center is approximately 4000 sq. feet and serves a population of over 65,201 with 29.4% over 55
  - Simi Valley Senior Center is approximately 22,000 sq. feet and serves a population of over 124,237 with 22.3% over 55
  - Thousand Oaks Senior Center is approximately 21,000 sq. feet and serves a population of over 126,683 with 27.6% over 55



### District Only Solutions

• Due to the District's modest financial means, without additional revenue sources and a partner, the District will not be capable of meeting the needs of the Senior Community



### Steps to a Joint Solution

- Both City of Camarillo and PVRPD agree to an ongoing Partnership to share/split future Senior Center costs
  - Examples:
    - Form Joint Powers Authority
    - Each Agency takes ownership of a different cost component
- Develop timeline and implementation plan
